Tallygaroopna PS Morning Reading Routine TRIAL PERIOD

Dear Parents,

After consultation with School Council and feedback received from parents, we have decided to go ahead with a whole-school approach to morning reading between 8.45 – 9am. This is in line with many schools in our area. Feedback received was extremely positive and we would like to thank everyone that made contact with us in regards to this.

We would like to begin morning reading Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday mornings from Week 7 (**beginning Tuesday May 29th**). Due to Breakfast Club and assembly occurring each Monday morning, we feel that trying to include this dedicated reading time on a Monday would make an already busy morning even busier.

During this time, on Tuesday – Friday, Foundation, Grade 1, Grade 2, Grade 3 and Grade 4 students will be in their classrooms. The 5/6 students will spread themselves amongst the F-4 classrooms, assisting with the process of listening to students read. This will provide the 5/6 students with additional responsibilities as our school leaders and we believe it will also continue to promote the very positive attitude towards reading that we currently have within our school. Next week, the 5/6 students will be shown how to undertake this reading time appropriately with the younger students.

We would still love as many parents as possible to come into our school during this time. We have calculated that if we have approximately 10 parent helpers across the school, along with 6 staff members listening to students read, and approximately 20 5/6 student helpers, with each aiming to listen to two students read, that we can successfully listen to almost all students read within this time. This would then allow for the morning literacy blocks within each class to occur as normal, without students removed from the room to read, causing disruption to teaching and student learning. This will also allow support staff to make better use of their time, enabling them to spend more one-on-one time with at risk students. In addition, the 5/6 students would not be missing out on their daily reading as they undertake independent reading at various times throughout the day.

This reading time is not compulsory; however, students will **not** be able to be playing out in the yard during this time, as supervision will not be provided. If a child arrives at school at 9am, we also will not be able to guarantee that they will be able to complete their daily reading. Whilst there will be a small amount of before school playtime that is lost as a result, our students receive sufficient time outside during recess and lunch. Classroom rolls will not be marked until after 9am, so students will not be considered late or absent if they are not present between 8.45 – 9am.

If you have any questions in regards to how this approach will operate, please see Liss Lothian. Liss will be seeking interest from parents about which days they may be available for morning reading.

We acknowledge that some tweaking of this approach may need to occur over time, but we are hopeful that this model will continue to support our students' literacy development and enthusiasm towards reading.

From the 8.45am bell, all students are to head inside to their classroom.

Foundation, Grade 1, Grade 2, Grade 3 & Grade 4 Students

- Change your reader.
- Sit with your bag in the designated area in your classroom.
- Read independently or practise your Sight Words whilst waiting for an adult or senior student to hear you read.



- After reading to an adult or senior student, put your reader bag away.
- Choose an interest book from your classroom library to read until the 9am bell.

5/6 Students

- Head to your designated classroom, depending on the day of the week (see timetable).
- Aim to listen to at least two students, remembering to sign their reading logs. Mark their names off on their class's Daily Reading Checklist.

Parents

- Aim to listen to two children read.
- Mark their names off on their class's Daily Reading Checklist.

Teachers

• Listen to students read, following Weekly Morning Reading Timetable.



16. Attitude to Schools Survey

Our school is conducting a survey to find out what your child thinks of our school - during a 3 week period beginning on Monday 30th April. The Attitudes to School survey is an annual student survey offered by the Department of Education and Training to assist schools in gaining an understanding of students' perceptions and experience of school. Our school will use the survey results to plan programs and activities to improve your child's schooling experience.

The Department has updated the survey for 2017 to include important new measures that are known to influence student engagement and performance. Students from Year 4 to Year 6 at our school will participate in the survey. Your child will complete the survey online during school hours using a purpose built secure online survey tool. It is important to note that we are not in any way "testing" your child. Your child has the right to refuse or withdraw from the survey at any point before, during, or after completion of the survey.

Your child will be provided with a unique login to complete the survey. The student login is an assigned identifier that may be used by the Department to combine data for research purposes only. Your child's privacy and the confidentiality of your child's survey responses will be protected at all times. No identifiable personal data is included in the survey response file. The survey results will be reported back to the school in term 3. No student can be identified in the results reported to schools or in any other report of the data. Some of these results will be available via the school newsletter.

This year the Attitudes to School survey will be conducted at our school over the period Monday 22nd May to Friday 9th June. The survey only takes 20-30 minutes to complete and occurs during your child's class time.

21. Absence Notes

Absence notes are required for all absences. Please use the school absence note or submit an absence on Flexibuzz. Both of these are the preferred methods because they are completed immediately. If either of these are not convenient please ring the school. Formal notes are needed for audit records and your support would be appreciated. We would prefer no text messages.

What happens if absences continue – 7 days a term turns into 28 days a year, which turns into 196 days over 7 years. This results in a child missing 1 whole year of their Primary School years – something for all of us to think about.


