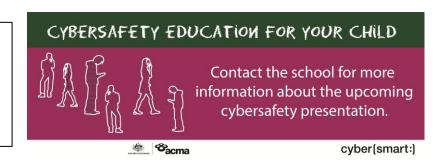

5. Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability

Our school is participating in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (Data Collection). This Data Collection is taking place in government, Catholic and Independent schools across Australia, and will provide valuable information about supports required for a broad group of students. This will enable Australian and State governments to better target support and resources in schools. This in turn will help schools give students with disability the support they need.

The Data Collection is not limited to students with diagnosed disabilities. It uses a very broad definition of disability, taken from the *Disability Discrimination Act* 1992 and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, which describe a broad range of health and learning conditions for which schools are required to provide 'reasonable adjustments' to support students to participate on the same basis as other students.

The Data Collection is taking place during Terms 2 and 3. No personal or identifying information about any student will be included, however, if you decide you do not wish information about your child to be included in the Data Collection, you can optout by signing and returning an opt-out consent form. 6. Some Secrets Should Never Be Kept

Recently there have been some issues of sexual abuse come up in the Newspapers and on News Reports on TV. If you want some assistance in how to talk about these things with your child or children, the school has available a book called "Some Secrets Should Never Be Kept" written by Jayneen Saunders, which has been donated by CASA. It is not suitable for children to read alone and should only be read with an adult who is prepared to talk to them about the issues within the book. The book is available only through the School Office.

7. Postcards from My Backyard – Art Display

Sue Cowan and Gwenifer Hack teach Art / Craft across 27 schools and have compiled this exhibition titled<u>" Postcards From My Backyard</u>". The postcards encapsulate what children have homed in on ", in their backyards be it real or imaginary. This service is for smaller schools of less than 100 enrolments. The visit every fortnight by the "Art Van" is a highlight to many students.

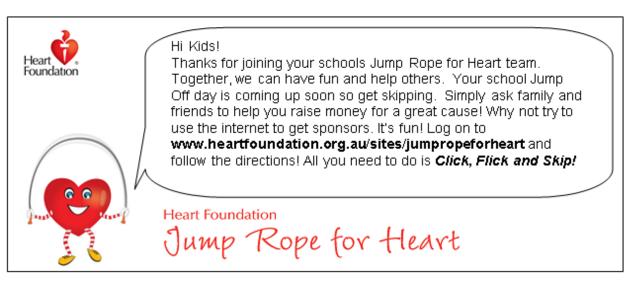

Advice to help manage children's time online

A child's life is full of opportunities for them to spend time out of school with community groups, sporting clubs and their friends. Spending time online is also a regular activity for many children who enjoy communicating with friends, sharing information and playing games.

Whilst there are no guidelines for the 'right' amount of time someone should spend online or gaming, if your child is being negatively impacted by excessive use it may be time to discuss how they can take action to maintain a healthy balance.

- Look for indicators that your child may be spending too much time online, such as a declined interest in other activities, talking constantly about an online game or activity, a decline in grades, or irritability.
- Discuss how other aspects of their life are being affected. Excessive use can impact on someone's health and wellbeing, family, relationships, work or education.
- Consider establishing rules about when your child can play games or use the internet and how long they can play for. You might make a mutual agreement to set a balance of online and offline activities.
 You may need to establish consequences for rule breaches.
 Depending on the age of the child you may also set passwords that they do not know.
- Locate the computer in a shared or visible place in the home so you know how much time your child is being spent online and what they are doing online.
- Seek support if you have concerns. Visit the Cybersmart Online Helpline to access free, confidential counselling for children and young people.
