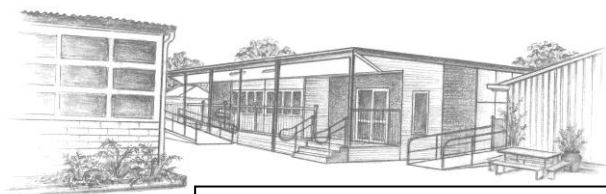

1. Responsible Pet Program

Our whole school will be participating in this program on Thursday. The Responsible Pet Ownership Primary School Program is aimed at 5-12 year olds and has been delivered to over 1 million Victorian primary school children. It visits over 800 primary schools each year across the state. The Program includes a dog visit, multimedia tools, role play, song and story time.

The Program focuses on teaching students about dog safety:

- * when dogs should be left alone
- * things we should not do to dogs
- * how can you tell if a dog is happy, frightened or angry
- * a safe way to approach and greet a dog
- * what to do if approached by an unknown or aggressive dog.

The Program also introduces and develops the following concepts:

- * choosing an appropriate pet general welfare and husbandry
- * the importance of identification and registration
- * confinement and housing, exercise and training.

There are a range of presentations designed to target the specific audiences in relation to grade level, prior knowledge and learning modes. All dogs used in the program are carefully tested and under the control of a pet educator at all times. Below is a summary of specific times for our program:

Grade 4/5/6 – 9.30am to 10.10am

Grade 2/3 – 10.15am to 10.55am

Foundation / Grade 1 – 11.30am to 12.10pm



2. GRIP Leadership Conference

Mr Brodie will be attending a Student Leadership Conference with Harvey and Kyle on Wednesday in Melbourne. This day will aid our School Captains with their role for the year and we look forward to seeing them grow into their role as the year goes on.

3. Meditation

Our school is fortunate to be involved in a Pilot Meditation Program which will be free of cost to our school. At present, we are unsure how long this program will go for but we are hopeful that it is a positive experience for all involved and becomes an ongoing part of our school programs. The meditation sessions will give our children an opportunity to calm down and relax after being outside at recess which will aid their time in class in the afternoon. All teachers involved have completed a pre evaluation form on each student which focuses on the following questions:

1. The child responds to direction from teachers
2. The child interacts appropriately with other students
3. The child is able to focus in class
4. The child contributes to sharing and discussion in class
5. The child is willing to try new things and challenges

4. Work Placements

We are hopeful of having some Work Placements in our senior and junior classrooms for 3 days a week (Tues, Wed and Thurs) for 26 weeks of the school year. Although, the majority of the costs for this program are funded there is a small financial commitment by the school which will be discussed at School Council on Wednesday night. If formal approval is granted, people appointed to these positions will act as Classroom Assistants beginning on Tuesday 23rd February. We anticipate this program would cease at the end of Term 3, once the funding concludes. Processes involving Working With Children and National Police Checks would be adhered to. More details will be available soon.

5. Student Insurance

Parents are reminded that the Department does not provide personal accident insurance or ambulance cover for students. Parents and guardians of students, who do not have student accident insurance/ambulance cover, are responsible for paying the cost of medical treatment for injured students, including the cost of ambulance attendance/transport and any other transport costs.

In some circumstances, medical or other expenses will be paid by the Department where it is assessed that it is likely, in all the circumstances, that the Department is liable for negligent (careless) acts or omissions of its staff/volunteers.

Student accident insurance/ambulance cover policies are available from some commercial insurers, and can be obtained by school councils on a whole-of-school basis, or by parents/guardians for individual students.

Private property brought to school by students, staff or visitors is not insured and the Department does not accept any responsibility for any loss or damage.

6. Car Park

A reminder to all families about using the Car Park safely at the start and end of the school day. Obviously, schools are busy places and if we all follow these guidelines we will have no major incidents. The main points from the School Car Parking Policy are:

- 1. Parents may drop off children at the walking path in the car park every morning.**
- 2. At the end of the day, children are only to enter the Car Park once they have been collected by their parents. Children will assemble in the Senior Playground area and be monitored by staff.**

7. Speech Therapy

Unfortunately, our session which was scheduled for Friday 5th February was cancelled. This session has been rescheduled now to this Thursday 18th February and all families involved will get a formal letter home on Tuesday. Sorry for the inconvenience in regard to this.

8. Uniform Policy

This policy is also in this edition of the newsletter and is recommended reading. All students must wear enclosed shoes at school although this is not formally listed in this policy. Thanks to a Mum, who brought this to my attention last week so a minor amendment may be discussed at School Council. The following information is in our Student Information Booklet which is available on our School Website.

Appropriate footwear - Footwear suitable for outdoor activities

Inappropriate footwear - Thongs or high-heeled shoes

9. Foundation Students - Testing

We have made a successful start to the formal Testing days for the Foundation Students. A big thank you to all of the families who kept to these strict timeframes and this makes Miss Beer's workload much easier during this time. Mr Brodie will be taking the F/1 class during all of these Testing Days. Parents will be reminded of these times via Tqibiz.

10. Start of School Bags

More than 52,000 preps received brand new, custom-designed library bags as they began school. Unfortunately, we are awaiting some on back order so all of the Foundation Students have not been given these as yet. Students will receive these when they arrive in the next week or two. The initial order was completed based on our initial numbers last year, but obviously our anticipated numbers have increased since then. Sorry for any inconvenience.

11. Red Day / Casual Day

Our whole school will be involved in a Fun Wear Red Day on Friday 26th February. The students will make some posters and pictures to recognise the contribution of our CFA Fire Fighters and we will be fortunate to have a Fire Truck Visit to school from 11.30am until 1pm as well. The Parents Club will assist with some balloons on the fence and any students wearing red (Casual Day) are asked to contribute a Gold Coin Donation (per family).

12. Nursing Program

Robyn Lewis from the Primary School Nursing Program will be visiting our school tomorrow. Robyn will assess all the Foundation children and follow up referrals and provide advice and health information. Parents of children in Foundation will need to return their Questionnaire before Robyn attends on Tuesday.

13. New Student Netbooks

We are pleased to announce that we have just purchased 8 new computers for our students to use at school. We hope that these will be set up and available for student use by the end of the month. This purchase has come about because of the School Computer Levy (which was introduced in 2015), in which all families are required to pay \$50 per family for computer use. We have also repaired a number of computers which had keys taken off, so please reinforce good computer use with your children.

All families should have now have signed and returned the ESmart Policy which is mandated so that all children agree to good use of computers. If you have not signed and returned this document, please do so ASAP. It is essential, that children utilise computers at school so that specific activities in class can be reinforced with engaging computer tasks, which are set by class teachers.

14. Outside School Hours Care

* The first day of Term 1 is a student-free day in all government schools to allow for appropriate planning to take place for the arrival of students. Each year government schools are provided with four student-free days for professional development, school planning and administration, curriculum development, and student assessment and reporting purposes. The remaining three student-free days are determined by each individual school, so contact your school for details.

17. Parents Club

Rationale:

- The parking of cars and other vehicles in and around the school grounds is a daily necessity, but also raises a number of safety and traffic issues that must be well managed.

Aims:

- To ensure that car and vehicle parking in and around the school grounds is orderly, safe and in accordance with the law.

Implementation:

- The parking of any vehicle inside the school grounds is at the discretion of the principal.
- The staff car park is for use by staff members only, and may be clearly signposted as such.
- Parents or visitors who park in the staff car park will be reminded of the need to park elsewhere. Habitual offenders will be referred to the local municipal council for prosecution or provided with an official Trespass warning from the principal.
- In return, the visitor's car park and on-street parking will not be used by staff.
- School Council will work with the municipal council to ensure all on-street parking is clearly signposted and School Council will seek cooperation from the local municipal council in ensuring that on-street parking has appropriate time zones applied.
- School Council will encourage frequent visitations from local parking enforcement officers to ensure compliance with parking regulations.
- Staff members will not approach members of the community who are parking inappropriately outside the school grounds.
- No person other than a staff member is to drive a vehicle onto the school grounds without prior approval from the school principal or his / her delegate.
- All school gates may be securely locked out of school hours, with keys sparingly distributed to appropriate people.
- Sufficient disabled car parking will be available and monitored.
- The school may provide a staggered finish to the school day to encourage parents to collect students and leave the car park, making room for the parents of the next group of students to park their cars.
- Parents may drop off children at the walking path in the car park every morning.
- At the end of the day, children are only to enter the Car Park once they have been collected by their parents. Children will assemble in the Senior Playground area and be monitored by staff.
- The school will implement a Walk Safely to School Program each year to encourage children to walk safely to school.
- A Bike Ed program will be implemented to encourage safe bike riding the school.
- Proper and safe parking practices will be regular features of the school newsletter.
- Damage to vehicles parked on school grounds is generally not covered by the Department of Education insurance.

Evaluation:

This policy will be reviewed as part of the school's three-year review cycle and feedback will be sought from the School Community

This policy was endorsed by School Council on Wed 27th August 2014.



Rationale:

- A uniform dress code reinforces in students a pride in their own appearance, instils recognition of themselves as an integral part of the school community, and assists in developing pride in representing their school. Issues of equality, health and safety, and expense are also factors that contribute to the establishment of the Dress Code.

Aims:

- To promote equality amongst all students.
- To further develop a sense of pride in, and identification with our school.
- To provide durable clothing that is cost effective and practical for our school environment.
- To maintain and enhance the positive image of the school in the community.

Implementation:

- After consultation with the school community and the Student Representative Council, School Council has developed a Dress Code that we believe provides choice for the students, allows for students to safely engage in the many varied school activities, and caters for the financial constraints of families.
- The Dress Code applies during school hours, while travelling to and from school, and when students are on school excursions. Change to this is subject to the Principals discretion.
- Summer and Winter uniforms, as well as a sports uniform will be prescribed, and are required to be worn.
- Stud earrings and sleepers worn in the ears, plus watches are the only acceptable jewellery.
- Extreme hair colors and/or extreme hairstyles are not permitted.
- Other than clear nail polish, cosmetics may not be worn at school.
- The only head wear that is acceptable is Sunsmart hats consistent with our Sunsmart policy. They must be worn outside from September until the end of April. Hats are not to be worn inside.
- From May until the end of August, school beanies and scarves are permitted to be worn outside.
- The Parents Club will accept good quality second hand uniforms, and will operate a second hand uniform store for parents.
- The student Dress Code, including details of uniform items and places of purchase, will be published in the newsletter at the start of each year.
- School Council requires the Principal be responsible for implementation of the Dress Code in a manner consistent with the Student Code of Conduct.
- Parents seeking exemptions to the Dress Code due to religious beliefs, ethnic or cultural background, student disability, health condition or economic hardship must apply in writing to the principal.

Evaluation:

- This policy will be reviewed as part of the school's three year review cycle and feedback will be sought from the School Community.
- This policy was updated and endorsed by School Council on Wed 5th August 2015.
- These policies will be implemented in accordance with our **Student Engagement Policy.**
