

SHEPPARTON EDUCATION PLAN

UPDATE FOR SCHOOL COMMUNITIES

As we work to provide you with ongoing information regarding the Shepparton Education Plan, we have welcomed your feedback and aim to listen to all your concerns. The information below aims to cover the most common enquiries we have received since releasing the Master Plan for the new secondary school.

Site selection

The Shepparton High School site was selected as the best location for the new secondary school, to be created by merging the four existing secondary schools. This follows a comprehensive assessment by independent property consultants. The property consultants took into account a number of factors when considering possible locations, including:

- public transport
- centrality and equity of travel for students
- easy walking distance to Latrobe University and GOTAFE
- size of school grounds
- flood overlay

Given this school will provide for the Greater Shepparton community, it is important that a wide range of relevant criteria were reviewed for the selection of the site. As a result, Shepparton High was the best choice. It will ensure that maximum funding will go toward providing state-of-the-art facilities rather than being depleted by remediation works.

Details about the Shepparton High School site Space

We intend to introduce a 'house' system so students have smaller and supportive learning environments alongside all of the resource and broader curriculum benefits of a larger school. The school will have nine houses of approximately 300 students each structured into three 'neighbourhoods', each with three 'houses'.

Structurally, the neighbourhoods and houses will be multi-storey buildings that include classrooms, breakout learning zones and specialist areas.

The site is designed to accommodate the students currently attending the four schools while allowing room for expected growth.

Outdoor space

The school design will provide significant outdoor space for students, from large ovals and hard courts to smaller garden and landscaped areas.

Specifically regarding sporting and recreational facilities, Shepparton High has an existing oval, however future work is intended to create an additional recreational space at Ford Reserve.

Traffic & public transport options

A draft traffic management plan has been developed and discussions are continuing with Greater Shepparton City Council to address traffic management requirements and ensure that students and parents are able to move easily to and from the new site.

Access to public transport for students will be made easier through the an intended bus interchange that will be located at Hawdon Street.

The <u>VSBA website</u> will also be updated regularly regarding plans for the new Shepparton Secondary College as we progress.



2. BYOD Program - Grade 5/6

A couple of weeks ago, our BYO iPad option for 5/6 students, along with our BYO iPad policy, was approved by School Council. Liss Lothian will be presenting a brief information session for parents in the last week of school.

While this is a very busy time for everyone, we thought it was important to disseminate this information prior to the summer holidays so parents could make an informed decision about whether or not their child/children will bring along their own device next year.

Liss will create a video so that this information can be accessed by those who are unable to attend. A more in-depth information session will be held at the beginning of 2019.

3. Sign In Book – Child Safety Standards

We recently had our School Review and we need to improve on processes for any visitors coming into the school. We have a visitors book at the office that needs to be utilised every time when parents come into the school and leave the school. Therefore, please come directly into the office instead of walking straight into classrooms - which seems to be the norm at present for many parents.

We would like to continue to make our school a welcoming and family friendly environment, so unfortunately this is just some red tape that needs to be ticked off. These processes are not relevant for any pickups from 3.25pm. Any parents picking up children before 3.25pm or late arrivals to school need to utilise the Late Arrivals/Early Departures book at the office.

4. Students Arriving Early at School

Parents are reminded that grounds supervision does not begin until 8.30am so please do not send students early to school for the sake of it or to play. This is documented in our staff supervision policy. We know there are a handful of families that do make early drop offs but these students will now not be allowed outside until 8.30am or until supervision begins. Before 8.30am - these students will remain in the BER room instead of roaming around the school grounds unsupervised. Please reinforce this at home and only have children arrive early to school if needed (ie: early work commitments).

5. Outstanding Fees

Family statements for outstanding fees have been sent home with the relevant students. Please make payment as soon as possible. If you have not already paid for the adult attending Fun Fields, please do so as soon as possible - this fee of \$35 per adult does not appear on the family statements. If you have any questions, please see Karen.

6. School Reports

School reports were distributed in sealed envelopes today. If parents would like some more feedback about individual student performance at school feel free to contact class teachers to arrange an informal meeting once reports are distributed to families. Teachers spend a lot of valuable time putting these together so please take the time to read these before the school year ends. Remember that these reports can be placed in the green report folders which every student at school should have.

The report cards have:

- * a chart with an A-E rating (Well Above the Expected Standard Well Below the Expected Standard), showing your child's current progress against the expected state-wide standard as well as the progress they have made since the previous year
- * a chart showing your child's level of effort and class behaviour
- * details about attendance
- * easy to understand comments from teachers outlining what your child knows and can do, any areas in which your child needs to be given further help or extended, and how this will be done.

What exactly do the A-E ratings mean?

A indicates achievement that is **above the standard expected** for your child's year level at the time of reporting (12 months or more ahead of the standard expected at the time of reporting)

B indicates achievement that is **above the standard expected** for your child's year level at the time of reporting. It means that your child understands more complex ideas and has a broader range of skills than would normally be expected.

C indicates achievement that is **at the standard expected** for your child's year level at the time of reporting. It means that your child's learning is on track and that they understand and can apply the range of skills and knowledge expected for their year level at the time of reporting.

D indicates achievement that is **below the standard expected** for your child's year level at the time of reporting. It means that there are some skills and knowledge that your child has yet to acquire before they can be said to be achieving at the expected standard.

E indicates achievement that is **well below the standard expected** for your child's year level at the time of reporting. It means there are significant areas of knowledge and skills your child needs to acquire before they can be said to be achieving at the expected standard.

Isn't a 'C' a disappointing result?

No it is not at all. It is important to remember that if your child receives a 'C' on the report card it indicates that their *learning is on track* and they are achieving the statewide standard that *is expected of them* at the time of reporting. In the past, a 'C' in some schools might have meant that the child was performing below the expected standard. This is no longer the case.

7. Shirt Signing

Only Grade 6 students will have an opportunity to sign some of their school shirts if they have **written permission by their parents. This will need to be handed into Miss Love**. This will occur on the last day of school in the morning and all shirts to be signed should be placed in a plastic bag. The last day of the year is a casual day so no school uniforms will be required on this day. Please take into consideration if you would like to use these uniforms into the future. The day gives students the chance to take away a souvenir from their time at Primary School – not compulsory.

8. Borrowing Agreement - MARC Van (Library)

At the last School Council meeting, we endorsed a borrowing agreement for 2019 and beyond. This relates to the prompt payment of lost or damaged resources by the required date, or a borrowing suspension will take place. As a result, all families will be asked to sign a borrowing agreement next year.

The MARC service to rural schools in our area provides a valued and important service to children in small schools. The service provides access to a wider range of learning resources than would otherwise be the case to both teachers and students and overcomes some of the disadvantages of size and rural isolation. Teaching sessions focus upon literature, information skills and technologies with access to a large school library.

Participating schools pay a per capita levy to the MARC Service for the purchase and maintenance of stock. The Committee of Management of the Congupna based MARC Van requires that individual schools take responsibility for the cost of books and materials that are lost or damaged. This cost will be passed on to the families of students who have lost or damaged books.

We are taking the first of these at the start of the year - the remaining three student-free days are determined by each individual school, so contact your school for details.

18. Education Support Staff

We are fortunate to have some great Education Support staff at our school to assist classroom teachers and students with specific learning needs at school. At present, we have Dee Palmer, Bec Wayman and Sarah Trimble at our school and I am pleased to officially welcome Stephanie Mansfield to this team for 2019. Stephanie has worked at our school for the last couple of years as a volunteer and we know that she will be a fine addition to our staffing profile at TPS.

19. School Fees

These have been approved at School Council and are summarised below – some minor changes have taken place for 2019, with the exception of the Grade 5/6 fees which include the Science Program bus costs which will be implemented at Shepparton High School during terms 1 and 2 (please note the change in the grade 5/6 fee from what was previously advised).

With the new Education Department Guidelines specific items need to be itemised hence some minor differences between fees for different year levels. These fees do not include excursions (except for the grade 5/6 Science Program at Shepparton High), swimming, camps or bus fees (for applicable families). Excursions are estimated to be \$50 to \$70 for Foundation to Grade 4 and \$60 to \$100 for Grade 5/6.

20. Bus Costs Proposal

All bus travellers for 2019 should have received a formal letter from School Council in regard to fees for bus use for next year – ineligible families only. This was introduced for the first time this year and School Council has endorsed the same costs for the new year. The school currently makes a large financial contribution in supporting families, so some changes were necessary in line with increasing costs. If you did not receive this letter, which was sent by mail – contact the school and a new letter will be sent home immediately.
